Dear Friends...



If you are anything like me, you will be utterly bemused by all the talk of credit crunch, liquidity crisis and stock-market bail-outs. The world of Wall Street and the Stock Exchange seems to have gone mad and everything is in what the economic experts call “melt-down”. The amounts of money are staggering – literally trillions of dollars and billions of pounds – and it all seems more and more confusing and impenetrable with each passing day. Like most people, I just keep my head down and am grateful that, for the time being at least, there is a roof over it! Many are not so fortunate.

We are told that it's all the fault of “the Money Men”. Who are they? A few years ago the then Chancellor of the Exchequer, Nigel Lawson, called people who work in the City “teen-age scribblers.” Have they grown up and turned into thirty-something scribblers? And has their scribbling brought us all into the state we are now? I have to say that I find it hard to understand how people in the finance industry can earn such vast bonuses each year, but I am told that some of them are physically and mentally exhausted after just a few years of shouting and waving across the floor of the Stock Exchange, so maybe they deserve their bonuses.

Where does it all leave you and me? Probably, if we are honest, the answer is in a state of considerable anxiety. After all, there is precious little ordinary folk like you and me can do to affect world economic conditions. We are told that our savings will be safe and that we must ignore the way that banks and former building

societies seem to be toppling over like nine-pins, but memories passed on by parents and grand-parents of austerity and unemployment are not encouraging.

Is there a Christian perspective on all this? Was the Archbishop of York right when he characterised some people involved in the money markets as “bank-robbers”? Words such as “greed” and “debt” have a very unpleasant ring about them, but there is an inevitability about such things in a world where the mantra is “You have to speculate in order to accumulate.” So, is Capitalism dead, just as Communism died in 1989? Is this the dawn of a new era? Would that it was!

However, there is an even more important question to ask. If we in the rich, well resourced part of the world are going to find it hard, what about those people hanging on to dear life in the Sahel area of North Africa, where drought and desertification are destroying any possibility of a decent life, or in reality, any life at all?

To lose your home is one of the worst things that can ever happen to anyone. Please God it doesn't happen to you, but maybe – just maybe – the calamity which seems to be engulfing us at the moment could have just one positive effect. Maybe it will encourage us to realise that the love we share with those close to us is infinitely more precious than figures on a bank-statement. Maybe it will help us to appreciate the incredible generosity of our heavenly Father, in sending His Son to bring us back to Himself. I hope so.

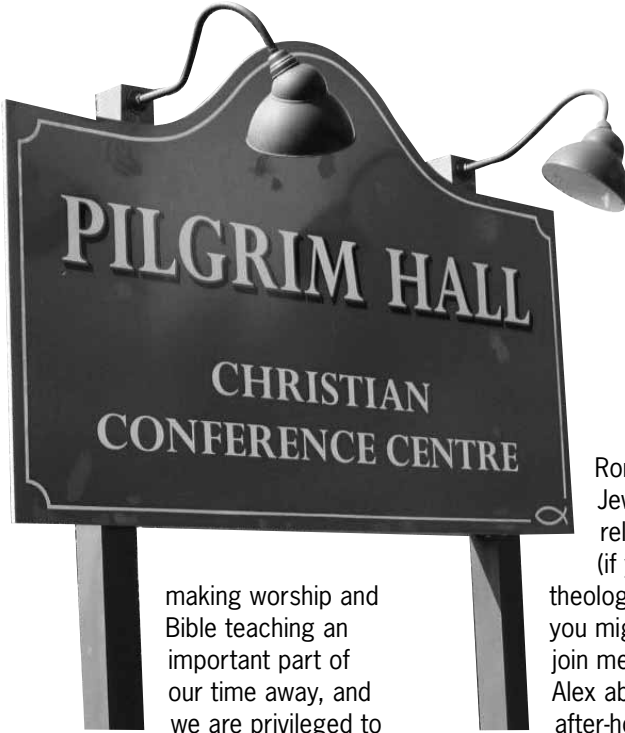
Our God, our Faith, our Family

It was at the Church Meeting in September 2007 that we as a church took the step of faith to commit ourselves to secure the exclusive use of the conference centre at Pilgrim Hall for our Church Weekend away on 21st – 23rd November this year. In a further step of faith, we decided to follow the elders' recommendation not to publicise the actual cost, leaving people to contribute as the Lord laid on their hearts, so that no-one would be barred from attending because they couldn't afford it. There may have been some doubts as to whether we would fill the place, and whether the money would be raised – but, praise God, our faith has been justified. On the first count, we are full to overflowing and are having

to utilise a nearby hotel for overflow accommodation. As to the cost, we have, at the time of writing, approaching 95% of the cost covered by voluntary donations in the Celebr8 envelopes. Praise God that he honours us when we step out in faith, whether as a church or as individuals.

And so we are confident that our Weekend Away is going to be a highlight in the life of Lindfield URC. Our Celebr8 logo enjoins us to celebrate our God, our faith and our family, and we are looking forward to doing just that at Pilgrim Hall. But this involves preparing ourselves, and not just by thinking up a good sketch for Saturday night! More important is that we arrive at Pilgrim Hall expecting God to do something new in our lives as individuals and as a church.

We will celebrate our God by



making worship and Bible teaching an important part of our time away, and we are privileged to have as our guest

the Rev Alex Jacob. Alex is a URC minister who has served pastorates in Lichfield, Aylesbury and Linton, Cambs. He is now Director of Advocacy for the Church's Ministry Amongst Jewish People (CMJ), based in Nottingham. Alex lives at Cambridge with his wife Mandy, and they have three children aged 14 upwards. There will be an opportunity during the weekend to hear more about the work of CMJ, which will celebrate its Bicentennial in 2009. He is currently pursuing postgraduate research based mainly on

Romans 9-11 and Jewish-Christian relations (if you're

theologically inclined, you might like to join me in quizzing Alex about this at an after-hours session!).

Alex relaxes by playing hockey and chess, and he supports Cambridge United football club (so there are worse things than following Brighton and Hove Albion!). He enjoys Indian food and listening to Bob Dylan – and, we hope, speaking at Church Weekends.

Our Weekend programme also ensures that we have time for our Church family. The size of our membership and our very full range of weekly activities has a downside – that few of us have the time to get to know people outside our circle of friends, beyond the quick greeting on

a Sunday morning. What made Unite 2001, our last Weekend Away, such a blessing to me as a new church member was to discover some wonderful people who had previously just been faces. So we'll be having fun together – the Family Ball on Saturday evening is part of this as we enjoy seeing people display hidden talents for song, poetry, acting or humour at our Concert Party. But we'll be doing more than having fun together – it would be wonderful if each of us, as part of his or her preparation, were praying that we would be part of God's blessing to others. New Testament teaching on the church is full of references to "one another." Things like loving one another, praying for one another, encouraging one another, and many more. I've put a list of some of the references at the foot of this article; why not engage in a little Bible study of your own as part of your preparation, and resolve to be a blessing to someone at Pilgrim Hall?

One sad thing about an event like this is that some of you, for very good reasons, have not been able to sign up, and it is easy for you to feel left on

the sidelines. We don't want you to feel like this, and we are very grateful that some of you have been able to contribute to the Weekend by giving a gift to enable others to attend. Will you pray in particular for those of us on the committee as we ensure that the practical running of the Weekend goes well. And of course that Alex Jacob may experience the liberty and power of the Spirit and will himself be blessed as he ministers to us. There will, as you know, be no Sunday morning services in our church on 23rd November, so we pray that God will bless you if you are planning to worship with one of our sister churches in the village. But there is no reason why you should not drive down to Pilgrim Hall on that morning (or get a lift with someone) to join with us in the worship and teaching sessions – any committee member will give you directions. But remember that

(unless you have already booked meals) you will not be able to eat with us, because we have

already confirmed final numbers with Pilgrim Hall.

Book Review – The Shack

This book is causing a bit of a stir. Some have loved it and have been ‘blessed’ by it. Others are deeply suspicious of it to the point that they suggest that it is heretical. So that’s whetted your curiosity!!

In essence it is a story, a fictional narrative, about one man and his journey to a greater understanding of God’s love for and commitment to him. It is deeply moving and will bring you to tears. It is also light-hearted and makes you smile. It is not a theological thesis, it is fiction and the purpose of fiction is to “stimulate the imagination”. Is that a bad thing, when so often we in fact reduce the scope of God’s love by our limited human imaginations?

It’s a book worth reading, but it should be read understanding it is a novel; one man’s attempt to put into words his view of God’s faithfulness and love to him in story form. But maybe it can help us too.

Reading and music

I work just ten minutes walk from Holy Trinity Brompton and, one lunchtime recently, took advantage of this proximity to browse for Christmas present ideas in their extensive bookshop. They have a number of 'Top10' categories of best sellers and I record below the top five in their Christian Life, Biography and CD categories. Some of the items are new, some of them old, but there is something for every taste.

Christian Life Top 5

1. **Graham Tomlin (2007) The seven deadly sins and how to overcome them**

Today the attitude of many is, "I know I shouldn't really, but it will be fun and won't do anyone any harm". As the cover says, this book is written, "for a world where sin evokes smirks rather than shudders".

2. **Tom Wright (2007) Surprised by Hope**

The author is the Bishop of Durham and he examines what Christians hope for and how it affects the way we live here and now. He asks, "What do we mean by the 'resurrection of the body' and how does that fit in with the image of sitting on clouds playing harps?". Sounds like a good read as it's always worried me that the thought of playing a harp for eternity doesn't tick my box for excitement!

3. **Rick Warren (2002) The purpose driven life**

This will be familiar to many because over twenty million copies have been sold and it has been used as a study book by some of the Lindfield URC house groups. It was the Evangelical Christian Publishers Association (ECPA) Book of the Year in both 2003 and 2004!

4. **Philip Yancey (1997) What's so amazing about Grace?**

More than ten years on and it's still in the "Top 10". This was the ECPA Book of the Year in 1998.

5. **Andy Freeman and Peter Greig (2007) Punk Monk**

This is written by two champions of the 24-7 Prayer Movement (www.24-7Prayer.com), according to Peter Greig, "To encourage and equip people to establish their own communities of Christ-centred, mission-minded prayer groups as centres of

blessing, both for Jesus himself and for those who do not yet know him”.

Recommended: I am a sucker for books and while browsing I couldn't resist buying (perhaps I should read the section on greed

in the number one book above!) a copy of Nicky Gumbel's new book, *Is God a delusion?* (2008), too recently published to be in the top anything. This book looks to be a fascinating riposte to recent books by atheists, such as that of Richard Dawkins.

Biography Top 5

1. Nicky Cruz (1968) Run baby run

Forty years on from publication, its number one position demonstrates what a powerful message this book has carried across generations. It is a tale of conversion of a violent New York gang member to the point where he says, “You could cut me in a thousand pieces and lay them out in the street. But every piece would cry out ‘Jesus loves you’. And you'll never be able to run from that”.

2. Jackie Pullinger (with Andrew Quicke) (1980) Chasing the dragon

This is an amazing story of how one woman reached into the infamous ‘walled city’ of Hong Kong, rife with gang crime, prostitution and drug use – she found that baptism in the Holy Spirit was a powerful treatment for drug addiction.

3. Angus Buchan (with Jan Greenough and Val Waldeck) (2006) Faith like Potatoes

The author is a South African farmer of Scottish extraction and this book relates how his gentle but uncompromising faith carried him through drought, financial crisis and family tragedy. This true life story has been made into a film available on DVD, described as “an inspiring story of faith and perseverance”. Perhaps someone will watch it and let us know if the potatoes are like mash (great!) or Smash (not so great)?! By coincidence, only three days after I had first heard of Angus Buchan, Bill Green (over here from Perth) told

me that he is now helping to organise a Men's Conference in Western Australia for 1,500 men at which Angus, who he has met before, will be the main speaker. Clearly Bill's practice in helping with Men's Breakfasts at the URC has held him in good stead!

4. Bilquis Sheikh (with Richard Schneider) (1978) I dared to call him Father

Around for some years now but an unforgettable story of the struggles of a Pakistani woman who, reading about Jesus in the Koran, turns to the Holy Bible to learn more and, in so doing, encounters huge resistance from her culture.

5. Julie Sheldon (with Lucy Elphinstone) (1991) Dancer off her feet

A ballet star, stricken by illness and confined to a wheelchair for three years, Julie Sheldon is cured by the power of prayer and finds healing not just of her body, but of her mind and spirit also.

Recommended: Not even in the Top 10, but at least sharing the same bookshelves was Bear Gryll's (2000) biographical account, *Facing up*. This tells the story of how, at the age of 23, he became the youngest Briton to reach the summit of Mt Everest, only two years after breaking his back in a free-fall parachuting accident. This should be good reading for those of you who enjoy seeing him eating lizards or digging for water with his bare hands in his TV shows on survival.

Music Top 5

1. Tim Hughes Here I am to worship and When silence falls

This is a double CD so good value – I bought it for Helen and we both enjoy it, especially the title track of the first CD, *Light of the World (Here I am*

to worship). This was awarded the coveted Dove Award in 2003 for Inspirational Song of the Year by the Gospel Music Association, the biggest Christian music awards event. Tim Hughes works for Soul Survivor in Watford and leads worship events all over the world. He has written two books to help

those who are interested in, want to be involved in or even want to lead worship in church: Passion for Your name (2003) and Holding nothing back (2007).

2. Al Gordon Future Sound

4. Hillsong This is our God

5. Soul Survivor (featuring Tim Hughes!) Live 2007 – Living for Your glory

Recommended: For those of you who would like a fresh introduction to modern worship music why not get someone to order you The Best New Worship Songs.....Ever! This is a compilation of 50 of the most popular new worship songs on three CDs and a percentage of the profits go to Christian Aid. Sounds perfect for Christmas!

National Memorial Arboretum

Their Names will Live for Evermore

On a cool misty day in September Mike and I visited the National Memorial Arboretum in Alrewas, Staffordshire. The air was still and quiet and yet the air was charged with raw emotion, the hurt and sadness of a bereaved people whose hurt will never go away.

This Armed Forces Memorial was opened on the 12th October 2007 and was dedicated in the presence of the Queen. We had seen the opening ceremony on television and had vowed to visit it some day. We are so glad that we did.

There are more than 130 memorials on the site and it is surrounded with over 50,000 trees. These memorials are places of beauty and are incredibly moving. However, the main memorial is a stunning piece of architecture, it truly does render one speechless. There are two evocative bronze sculptures denoting suffering and bravery, one could gaze and gaze and feel the anguish of the portrayed figures. But even the sculptures did not prepare us for the emotion that we felt when we stood before the towering granite walls and saw the 16,000 names of those who have died since 1945, those who have died whilst on duty or as a result of terrorist action. Behind every name there are wives, husbands, partners, parents, children and colleagues who daily live with the sadness of their loss but also proudly honour their memory with thanksgiving.

The serenity and beauty of Alrewas will stay with us. The space left on those walls for 15,000 more names will haunt us and cause us to pray daily that wars may cease. The Millennium Chapel of Peace and Forgiveness observes a moment of silence and prayer at 11oc. every day of the year. This month gives us the opportunity to reflect, to remember and to pray for peace.

Sunday services explained...

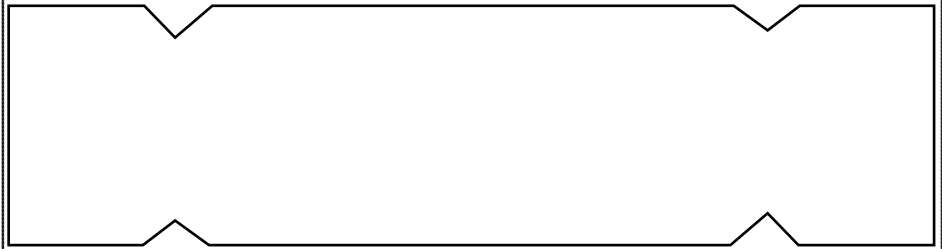

He knows me, and still accepts me. And uses me. WOW!

When a woman gate-crashes a dinner party and applies perfume to Jesus' feet, he knows she is "a sinner". Yet he accepts her, and her offering. It's the same when Jesus looks into a sycamore fig tree and asks the crooked tax collector Zacchaeus to come down, because he wants to go to his house for tea. It happens again and again. Jesus seeks out the least likely candidates as being those he can do business with.

He wants them to give up their bad habits, of course. But when they do, he forgives them. And he goes on forgiving them. Peter has one of the worst records of serially messing-up, yet still he is identified as the rock on which Jesus can build his church.

Long ago, I had an experience of Jesus' acceptance, through the love and interest of a congregation who could easily have ignored me. And of them allowing Jesus to use me, in important life-forming ways, even though I was a new Christian with very rough edges. When I got it wrong, I wasn't cast aside, I was

loved into getting it right. And Jesus has gone on accepting me and using me, even though I've not stopped getting it wrong.

The Emmaus movement grew out of an encounter between a Paris priest and a man called Georges who'd tried to commit suicide, because his family couldn't cope with his re-appearance, after twenty years in prison. The priest didn't only offer Georges Christian comfort, he asked: "Can you help in my work with the homeless?" And soon Georges was building shelters for those in need. He said later "Whatever else he might have done, I'd have tried to kill myself again. But what he gave me was a feeling of worth – of having something to offer".

More than anything, Christ's acceptance gives me a feeling of worth, even though I still let Him down. When I was asked to contribute to an autumn preaching series on "The Wow factor" it wasn't hard to identify that as the "Wow" factor for me.

– Uganda

This month we will be devoting our monthly giving to support the work that **Samuel Muhumuza** is doing in Uganda. He needs no introduction to most of us at Lindfield URC, having visited us twice in the last four years and with many of us sponsoring the education of 45 children.

He is the Pastor of the Kibaale/Ssanje Church, Director of the Spiritual Life Centre and heads up the Yesu Afaayo Project (Jesus Cares), which runs a school.

Samuel is married to Immaculate (called Immy) and they have four sons; Wycliffe, Shama, Calvin and Junior. They are also fostering a little girl who was abandoned. They named her Clever, sadly she has since been diagnosed HIV Positive..

Last October when he visited the UK we were able to donate a large proportion of the funding needed to build a 'Family House' for children at the school who, because of their circumstances,

need accommodation and looking after.

Both the church and school continue to grow. Samuel is wanting an assistant pastor to join his team to take some of the 'burden' of leading the church from him. The school now has 385 pupils with 16 teaching staff and 5 non-teaching. The school started about seven years ago with four children and one teacher!



School Block

Facilities are still fairly basic and there is a need for equipment for the school, including desks. Many of the children just sit on the floor for their lessons which is not ideal.

Samuels' next major project is to build a block for the nursery section that currently studies in temporary wooden shelters. The budget for this project is approximately £25,000 and would provide space for 100 children and staff.

Helen and I have been supporting Anthony from Uganda for the last six years and it has been a real joy to see him grow, both in stature (courtesy of the regular photographs we receive) and in knowledge, evident from the changes we see in his letters.

His first letters were mainly drawings of the things important in his life: his home, chickens, trees, a football! Now he writes in English really well, tells us what he has been up to, asks about our life and always ends with a Bible verse. The monthly donation we make provides Anthony with Bible teaching, health monitoring, educational tours, games and economic skills such as handcrafts. It also provides health and parenting education as well as literacy programmes for Anthony's father – his mother has died. In addition we provide modest sums for Birthday and Christmas gifts for Anthony. Our experience of Compassion, whose logo reads "Releasing Children from poverty in Jesus' name", has been really excellent. They keep us very well informed of Anthony's progress and we can read of the benefits of sponsorship of other children around the world through their quarterly magazine. We would recommend them to anyone. We asked to sponsor a boy from Africa simply because our sons could relate to him and we used to live in Africa, but you can choose to sponsor a boy or girl for £18 a month from Africa, Asia or Latin America.

Daily Struggles – Spiritual Warfare

Sad as it may be to have to admit it, but most of the less serious difficulties in church life don't come from the Devil. They come from our fellow Christians. Sometimes we can be less than loving and generous to each other. As an old Puritan once observed about one particularly cantankerous brother "I will not say that zeal for the Lord's house hath eaten him up, but it certainly doth appear to have devoured the greater part of his good manners!"

All the same, the more serious and potentially catastrophic problems we face do indeed have a spiritual origin. Christians individually and the Church collectively, are engaged in a constant, relentless struggle with evil spiritual forces that want nothing less than our total destruction. That is not an overstatement. The trouble is that most of us don't take it seriously, because the cleverest thing the Devil has ever done, is to get himself laughed at.

Two brothers were sitting next to one another in church one Sunday, when the Minister mentioned the Devil. One of them whispered to the other "I don't believe in the Devil. It's like Father Christmas – it's Dad." If only that were true! Let me repeat: Christians individually

and the Church collectively, are engaged in a constant, relentless struggle with spiritual forces of evil that want nothing less than our total destruction. St. Paul is quite clear in Ephesians 6: vv12ff.....

"Our struggle is not against flesh and blood, but against the rulers, against the authorities, against the powers of this dark world and against the spiritual forces of evil in the heavenly realms."

So, how do we cope with that struggle? I want to give you two suggestions - something we should do and something to avoid.

Something to do – stay close to Jesus.

Our spiritual enemy has a whole range of strategies and tactics because he is very

subtle. Very often we don't recognise his attacks, because he begins with suggestions that seem perfectly reasonable.

For instance, for men especially, the Internet is an area of real danger. You might be sitting alone in front of the lap-top with time on your hands. You begin to wonder what would appear if you typed a seemingly innocent word or phrase related to sex, into a search engine. Maybe you convince yourself that you are only trying to find out more about the whole area of human relationships, so in it goes. Suddenly you are offered a great assortment of enticing websites, some of which are clearly "no go" areas for Christians, but you've gone this far, so would it hurt if you went a little further? It's a terrible truth, but a very high proportion of Christian men habitually look at pornography on the Internet.

For women it may be different. You know your own danger zones, but the one thing the Devil wants to do is to lure you into thoughts and feelings that

take you away from Jesus, so the golden rule is stay close to Jesus! Having a daily quiet time, during which you read the Bible and pray, is one of the best ways to do that, but we have to be aware that as Scripture says, it's always the little foxes that spoil the vines. In other words, it's the small, seemingly insignificant temptations that lead to disaster. Not many of us are tempted to rob banks or murder our neighbours, but the delicious thrill of passing on the latest piece of gossip can be almost irresistible.

Something to avoid – letting the enemy pin you to the ground.

We all fall victim to temptation from time to time, but the secret of dealing with failure is to keep short accounts with God. In other words, when you are conscious that you have sinned, go straight back to the cross and give it to the Saviour. Never let un-confessed and un-forgiven sin pile up. The moment you realise what you have done, repent, ask

for forgiveness and then accept it. As Michel Quoist, a French Roman Catholic priest wrote, "It isn't falling that's worst, but staying on the ground!"

Another way his Satanic Majesty has of threatening and discouraging us is to induce fear. Fear is a terrible thing and it can paralyse our spiritual lives. Years ago, a consultant psychiatrist whom Jenny and I knew well and who had been a missionary in East Africa, gave us a piece of advice. During her time in Africa she had seen evil in its naked form, but she didn't let that intimidate her. "The spiritual powers of evil against which we struggle" she told us "could twist you round their little fingers if they wanted to. Your only security lies in the fact that beside you stands One Who makes them sick with fear." In saying that, she was reminding us of a verse from I. John – chapter 4: v.4. Referring to the way in which Holy Spirit lives in each and every Christian believer, he says.....

"..... the One Who is in you is greater than the one who is in the world."

Earlier on I said that our spiritual enemy is subtle and so he is. Indeed, he is of

infinite subtlety and if he cannot persuade you to underestimate him, he will do the opposite and make you so terrified of what he can do, that you lose confidence. Never ever think he can bring you down, unless you co-operate with him and allow him to.

This struggle goes on day after day, year after year, but we are on the winning side and just as the Nazis knew there was no real hope of victory after "D-Day", so his Satanic Majesty knows he's a defeated foe and needs to be reminded of that again and again.

There are so many more questions that can be asked on this subject, not least for instance "Where did evil come from in the first place?" All we know for sure is that our Lord Jesus Christ is victorious over every wicked spiritual entity. One day, at His Name, every knee shall bow and every tongue confess Him as Lord. Some will do so gladly; others will do so in spite of their implacable hatred and opposition. Those of us who love Him, look forward to that day with a great sense of hope and exaltation, because nothing and no one can ever rob Him of His victory!

You may not recognize the above logo or be aware that The Haven has operated in Burgess Hill for several years offering support to anyone facing an unexpected pregnancy or suffering from post abortion stress. Each client contacted is given the opportunity to talk privately and confidentially, either by phone or meeting with a councillor.

There are now two Centres open each Friday between 3 -5 pm, one at 54 Church Road, Burgess Hill and one at the Saltworkz Café in America Lane Haywards Heath where a trained counsellor will be available to talk with any person(s). Alternatively a more convenient time can always be arranged.

It is some 18 months since I first became involved with this work, recognizing that people who are facing an unexpected pregnancy need time and space to work through all the implications involved. The counsellor's role is to be alongside the client without being judgemental, to enable that person to explore her thoughts and feelings before making any decisions regarding the pregnancy. Whatever

decision the client makes, the counsellor is expected to give her ongoing support if requested.

The Haven is also developing opportunities to visit Secondary Schools/Colleges in this area. The aim is to talk with the students and explain in detail the development of a baby from conception and to discuss the hazards of casual sexual relationships. The students are also encouraged to keep themselves for sexual relationships within marriage.

Whilst The Haven is not overtly a Christian Organisation it is very much supported by prayer and the longing that each client would choose life for the unborn child.

The thousands of abortions that happen each year should deeply challenge us all and Pregnancy Counselling Centres around the UK are endeavouring to reach out to these people in crisis situations in the hope that they will carry the baby to term and find new purpose and meaning in their lives.

There will also be a new look to the way that Sunday mornings work from October onwards.

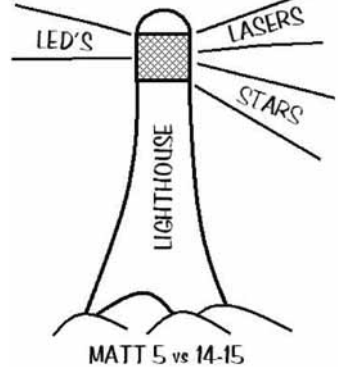

The value of nothing

“The cynic” Oscar Wilde quipped “knows the price of everything and the value of nothing” if that’s true then we are all living through highly cynical times.

As I write I am watching the world’s financial markets tumble on a Bloomberg terminal. With confidence and trust in banks and companies destroyed this high tech crystal ball can instantly display, chart and analyse the price of any asset, commodity or company on the planet to many decimal places. What it cannot tell me is the value of any of them.

The credit crunch is confounding banks, governments and politicians who have injected hundreds of billions of dollars to prop up the system. Staggering numbers several multiples of the money actually lost in the original US sub-prime mortgage crisis.

Without trust the banks are simply hoarding this extra money. The problem has moved beyond financial loss into lost faith, trust, and confidence. The credit crunch

is a crisis of truth and trust based on a vacuum of credibility, integrity and accountability. Without faith in each other banks and individuals are unwilling to invest or loan anything to anyone for any price.

What we are learning is that lost trust has a much greater value and is far more difficult to replace than lost money. Confidence is far more expensive than collateral to repair.

Without trust the price of stocks, banks, oil and even money itself has no reliable value at all. Our plunging markets reflect that.

In recent years the world has rewarded financial winners without regard for risk or reality – morality and integrity became viewed as valueless obstacles in the race to get rich quick. Fame and wealth have become the twin totems of success in a society which is

willing to turn a blind eye to both the methods by which they are achieved and their flimsy value and temporary status.

This has affected not just our financial wealth but the health of our families and communities. We may have never had more wealth or more possessions, but we have never felt less satisfied, less comfortable or less secure.

The bankruptcy of truth or 'credibility crunch' is proving that we should place a much higher value on truth and integrity because it is proving to be very expensive to replace.

Where banks and governments have failed churches must use their high street 'branches' to

inject truth and trust into our community. Unlike banks we must not hoard this valuable commodity for ourselves, ration it, or wrap it up in language which means only experts can understand it.

Market forces, supply and demand, risk and reward ultimately determine the true price of any asset. Tested on this basis truth and trust have turned out to be of almost immeasurable value. We must have no fear sharing from our rich and plentiful supply. God provides faith, hope, truth and love enough for all and his is a treasury truly too big to ever fail.
